

 England

Separate Powers Devolved Powers / Administered by London Elected Regional Assembly Not even part of the UK

MHCLG Ministry of Housing, Communities an Local Government)

Nature of Government Central Government v. Local Government

Local Councils (in the main) are the 'Planning Authority' ➤ Granting or refusing consent to develop land

BUT

All power comes from Central Government therefore
 ➤ Decisions of councils can be scrutinised and overturned by central government
 ➤ Including Performance Targets and ...
 ➤ Many Policies are set by Central Government

1. The Hierarchy of Responsibilities


Courts

Government (SoS, PINS, Agencies, etc)

Local Bodies (LAs, NPs, UDCs etc)

includes delegated and non-elected

2. What takes priority in Decision making? (Decisions have to be "Plan-led")



Detailed Policies

3. Decisions are Discretionary



➢Plans are not binding

Material Considerations can over-ride the plan

> Decisions must be 'rational'

Unauthorised development not criminalised

4 Decisions must be Evidence-based

For example of evidence needed to accompany a planning application

- Housing land assessment
- Financial Viability Assessment
- Traffic Impact Assessment.
- Retail Impact Assessment.
- EIA / ESA
- Design & Access Statement
- Etc


